2023 *at a* Glance

Direct HealthCare Division:

THE MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM

- Provided \$93,530 in mental health services through 1000 appointments.
- Provided case management services, linking families to food resources, financial assistance, mental health services for adults, and computer technology access.

THE MOBILE VISION PROGRAM

- + Screened **10,846** students /patients.
- QueensCare optometrist examined 2,179 students/patients.
- Dispensed 1,751 pairs of glasses free of charge.

THE MOBILE DENTAL PROGRAM

- Served 1,224 patients and completed 2,477 appointments.
- Performed a total of 5,182 procedures for a total value of \$157,730.

THE INPATIENT PROGRAM

- Paid \$7,550,000 in inpatient services through contracts with 13 hospitals.
- Largest recipient was Adventist Health White Memorial Medical Center in Boyle Heights with payments of \$2,000,000.

QueensCare Health &) Faith Partnership (QHFP):)

- Began the year serving three sites and by the end of the fiscal year boosted partnerships to twenty-three community partners, consisting of food banks, places of worship, shelters and other faith-based nonprofit social service agencies.
- Reinstated health screenings, delivering health education presentations, and expanding outreach efforts. QHFP served a total of 5,152 community members.

Pastoral Care Division:

 Chaplains responded to hundreds of calls offering prayers and support to patients at Hollywood Presbyterian Medical Center.

Charitable Division:

- Approved 37 grants totaling \$2,362,000 to local nonprofit organizations working in underserved communities across Los Angeles.
- Awarded 24 scholarships totaling \$240,000 to students pursuing healthcare fields who expressed an interest in serving communities in need through the John Joseph Brandlin Scholarship and Loan Repayment Program.
- Awarded \$1,916,000 to twelve local hospitals to serve patients by paying their uncovered costs of care through the Emergency Medical Services Fund.

These interdenominational chaplains, who come from all over the world and represent the diversity of the communities that QueensCare serves, pray with and for patients and their families in a multilingual, multicultural setting.


Like the Franciscan Sisters of the Sacred Heart before them, chaplains tend to the spiritual needs of patients experiencing illness and hospitalization. They also help patients' family members cope with fear, pain, and suffering related to severe illness and injury. Chaplains bring solace and counseling to the suffering, and to hospital staff when needed, visiting the hospital daily and conducting religious services that are attended by families, caregivers, and medical staff alike.

Brother Larry Moen, a Chaplain at QueensCare for over 21 years, epitomizes the important work done by the Pastoral Care Division. He has served at Hollywood Presbyterian Medical Center for much of his career and has been a strong advocate for patients who are facing serious health issues.

Brother Larry stated, "Because a hospital can be a scary place when you are facing a difficult medical condition, we provide spiritual support to our patients. It has been a very rewarding experience for me because QueensCare provides chaplains the support and education we need, not only to do our jobs, but to grow and change and be the best person we can be."

A True Visionary Program

Since 1999, the QueensCare Mobile Vision Program (MVP) has provided an on-campus vision clinic to select middle schools where 75% or more of the students qualify for the federal free or reduced lunch programs. Back in the day, the optometrists and Karen Chielens, Optometry Assistant, hoisted five very heavy suitcases, one weighing 80 pounds, filled with equipment up numerous flights of stairs at LAUSD schools to examine students for much needed eye glasses.

The MVP is decidedly different today. With 23 years in the program, Karen is now not only a highly skilled vision assistant, scheduler, and primary contact for school administrators, but also a skilled driver of QueensCare's new Ivan the Eye Van.

QueensCare's MVP is currently the only mobile vision program providing vision screening, exams, and glasses to students on LAUSD campuses. As such, it has become more common to receive requests for services for not only elementary and middle schools, but high schools, as well.

We are happy to have helped thousands of children in Los Angeles improve their vision through our program. We get to really know the kids and look forward to helping many more.⁹⁹

This year, the MVP provided services at a QueensCare community location until LAUSD's 2022-2023 academic year began. The MVP then screened students at 37 LAUSD campuses. QueensCare's optometrist, Dr. Duong, with help from assistant Karen, screened a total of 10,846 students/patients. Of these students, 1,751 needed, were prescribed, and given glasses, all free of charge to the students. The caring MVP team relates very well to each child in the program and sees many of them multiple times as their vision needs change.

The MVP also attended four health fairs this year, including the QueensCare 2nd Annual Holiday Health Fair. The MVP ended its fiscal year providing services at a new community site, South Central Los Angeles Ministry Project (South Central LAMP).

The Heart *of* the Community

QueensCare's Health & Faith Partnership (QHFP) parish nurses (PN) and community health workers (CHWs) work with affiliate sites to provide healthcare and other services with the goal of advancing healthier and stronger patients and communities.

Parish Nurse, Ana Murillo, RN, who has been with QueensCare for 22 years, is a vital link to healthcare for countless men, women, and children in Los Angeles. She has seen QueensCare become a strong advocate of the transformation of healthcare from a focus on acute care when sick, to preventative health and lifelong wellness. Programs that embrace better nutrition, exercise and appropriate medicines to better manage health are helping Angelinos cultivate new habits for lifelong health and wellness.

Ana Murillo stated, "As always, we are committed to those in need who depend on us. QueensCare is not a static organization, but is always looking for new tools and new ways to operate more effectively so we can help more people."

Building Community Partnerships

QHFP began the fiscal year supporting QueensCare Health Centers with COVID-19 and influenza vaccination efforts for adults and children in the community. QHFP hosted a total of 31 mobile vaccine clinics administering 599 vaccines: 252 COVID-19 vaccines and 347 influenza vaccines.

Throughout the fiscal year, QHFP focused on reestablishing its partnerships at prepandemic sites and expanding its services to new partners. It began the fiscal year with three sites and ended it with 23 community partners, consisting of food banks, places of worship, shelters, and other faith-based nonprofit social service agencies. Most sites were identified through needs assessments completed by QHFP CHWs.


QHFP also reinstated health screenings in the community, delivering health education presentations, and expanding outreach efforts. Blood pressure screenings, cholesterol screenings, osteoporosis screenings, health enrollment, health education, and referrals were among the services provided.


